
## What happened?



### **First Female Commanding Officer of Ghana Navy Ship sails to Nigeria for Maritime Exercise**

The Ghana Navy is deploying one of its River Class Ships, Ghana Navy Ship (GNS) ANKOBRA, which is under the command of Lieutenant Commander Priscilla Ami Dogbeda Dzokoto, the first female Commanding Officer of a Ghana Navy ship. Navies all over the world are predominantly dominated by men. It is therefore historic that the Ghana Navy has appointed its first female Commanding Officer.

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### **Ghana Navy Special Boat Squadron Trains To Secure Gulf Of Guinea**

The assault was a drill — part of annual training exercises for SBS members in partnership with U.S. and Danish militaries. At least 16 Heads of State from all eight regional blocs of the continent will be among the 500 high profile personalities, including business leaders, financiers, investment brokers and thought leaders who will attend the summit.

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## **Canada Names Two Arctic Offshore Patrol Ships for WWII Heroes**

The ships are part of the fleet of six Harry DeWolf-class Arctic and Offshore Patrol Ships (AOPS) being delivered to the Royal Canadian Navy as part of Canada's controversial National Shipbuilding Strategy. Two more will be delivered to the Canadian Coast Guard, but supply-chain issues and inflation have doubled the price for the follow-on CCG contract.

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## Drones Monitor Ship Emissions in English Channel, North Sea and Baltic

The European Maritime Safety Agency (EMSA) has resumed emission monitoring programs for ships operating within the EU Emission Control Areas in Northern Europe. Working with the French authorities, specially equipped drones are monitoring portions of the North Sea and the English Channel. In a similar effort based in Germany, they are launching a large-scale emissions monitoring campaign monitoring ships crossing portions of the Baltic.

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
